## **FACT** Lightning often strikes more than three miles from the center of the thunderstorm, far outside the rain or thunderstorm cloud. SAFETY TIP: WHEN THUNDER ROARS GO INDOORS MYTH Surge suppressors can protect a structure against lightning. **FACT** Surge suppressors are important, but can do nothing

SAFETY TIP: DO NOT LIE ON CONCRETE FLOORS NOR LEAN ON CONCRETE WALLS
